






City Mouse went to visit his friend Country Mouse.

City Mouse looked at the house. He saw old chairs, a little bed, and a crooked table.



"Please have something to eat," said Country Mouse.


Country Mouse passed City Mouse a plate of scraps. There were bread crusts, moldy cheeses, and old raisins. City Mouse had never eaten such food!




City Mouse said, "Country Mouse, you must visit the city. You will like the crowded streets and the fancy homes. And I'll feed you a real feast!"

They went into the great house where City Mouse made his home. Country Mouse looked at the huge chairs and silk rugs in the study.




"Please have something to eat," said City Mouse.

The mice sat down at a big table. There was fine cheese, fresh bread, and lemon cakes to eat.


"Now this is better than your country food, isn't it?" said City Mouse.
